


We are supporting **Christopher's Light Annual Toy** Drive.



HAVE YOURSELF A HOLY LITTLE CHRISTMAS

The "Christmas season" seems to begin earlier every year. Some stores had Christmas stuff on the shelves weeks before Halloween. What madness! We go dashing through the stores to the beat of *Jingle Bells*; and we go "Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree" until we crash from exhaustion.

Revelry and gift-giving are fine and fun, but if we're not careful they can snowball out of control. Stewarding a Holy and meaningful Christmas means balancing the commercial with the spiritual. Here are some tips:

Observe Advent: The four weeks *before* Christmas Day comprise the Advent Season, a time to *prepare* for Christmas through prayer, song, worship, and spiritual disciplines. Lean into the spirit of Advent. Advent devotionals can help (I recommend Richard Rohr's *Preparing for Christmas*).

Observe the Christmas *season*: The church calendar lists the *season* of Christmas from Dec. 24 to the feast of Epiphany on Jan. 6. Until the 20th century, these 12 Days of Christmas were the time for celebration and partying. Make them special in your life and family.

Cut the consumerism: Limit your shopping and spending by setting a strict budget or gifting the people in your life with homemade presents, favors, or ways to spend time together.

Party hardly: For some, Christmas is an excuse to overeat and drink to excess. Moderate your consumption.

Most importantly, pray: Ask God to help you and your family craft a meaningful and joyful Advent and Christmas. Ask God to send you wisdom, resources, and people who can journey through the spiritual season with you.

By carefully stewarding your faith life, Advent and Christmas can be a time for real spiritual growth.

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Advent is, like Lent, a season of preparation. We prepare for Christ's "Coming" (the meaning of Advent in Latin) in remembering his birth in Bethle-

hem, and his promise of coming again at the end of all things. In both senses, we are anticipating a radical change in our lives and in the world by God's incarnate presence among us. Therefore, we use the term "Emanuel" at this time of the year especially, which in Hebrew means "God with us." There are many important parts of the nativity story that we'll remember together: how Mary and Joseph were homeless as they sought a place to rest and prepare for the birth of Jesus. How the first to learn about the birth of the Messiah were not kings or governors, but lowly shepherds in the hills. How when the Magi visited Jesus from far away, they brought him not only kingly gifts of gold and frankincense incense, but also myrrh, an aromatic resin made into incense or oil that was used in the process of preparing the dead for burial in the ancient world. Even at his birth, his crucifixion is foreshadowed by this gift. For as we anticipate his birth and dwelling among us, we also remember his death and the promise of the resurrection.

One way that we'll be remembering this story and anticipating Christ's coming is through music. Both through the music we will sing together during Sunday worship, as well as a special event coming up in just a few weeks on **December 2**nd at 6:30pm, Winter Wonderland, a Christmas Recital. Our musical director, Gregg LeMay, has organized a recital to help us to get into the spirit of Advent and come together to enjoy some of the many wonderful musical pieces that we associate with this time of year. Gregg will be playing both sacred music as well as some secular Christmas music that everyone will recognize. The recital will also feature some shared pieces with other musicians, and our churches' joint choir will be

singing an anthem at the recital. I've been singing along with this choir for the past few weeks, and it's so nice to be part of a choir again- I missed it a lot! Hebron's sanctuary will also feature special decorations to help us to be fully immersed in the season. After the concert, we'll be gathering in Hebron's social hall for fellowship and refreshments. To connect this recital with Christ's mission in the world, we'll be gathering items for the Five Forces Homeless Heroes Stocking Project, which is collecting personal care items for homeless veterans around western Pennsylvania. Monetary donations will also be accepted. We're hoping that this recital tradition will continue each year rotating between our two churches. Please spread the word about this exciting opportunity to come together and listen to the beautiful music of Advent and Christmas.

But as always, the best way to prepare our hearts for Christ's coming is to join us in worship on Sunday mornings throughout Advent, as we light the candles on the wreath and remember the longing of the people of God for Christ to show us the way of peace. We will have our usual "Blue Christmas" Service at St Paul's Highfield on the winter solstice, Wednesday, December 21st at 6pm for anyone who is missing their loved ones at this time of the year. And we will of course have our Candlelight Christmas Eve services this year- 6pm at Hebron and 8pm at St Paul's Highfield. Since it lands on a Sunday this year, we'll just have one worship service on Christmas morning, at Hebron, at 8:30am.
