



Consider percentage-basis giving

No matter how or what amount you give to your congregation, thank you! Your offerings sustain important ministries, and there is no such thing as an inappropriate or inadequate offering.

But if you are among the many who give regularly on a "lump sum" basis, consider giving on a percentage basis instead.

The "lump sum" basis is when donors give a fixed amount – say, \$50 a week – to the church, regardless of what percentage it represents in their annual income. The advantage of lump sum giving is that it's simple to calculate and keep track of. But lump sum giving reveals little about the generosity behind the gift. For a poorer family, \$50 a week may be significant, whereas it could be a pittance for a wealthy family.

Since the Bible lifts up the principles of sacrificial giving as well as tithing, giving by percentage provides a better measure for giving. Once a family has calculated their gift as a percentage of income, it's easier to track it and, over time, build up to a tithe. Here's how to get started with percentage giving:

- Calculate your regular offering over the course of the year.
- Divide the total yearly offering by your total annual income. This will give you a figure.
- Multiply that figure by 100 to determine your percentage giving.

When planning your offering, consider increasing it by 1 percent a year. If you do, in less than 10 years you will be tithing. However you give, thank you for supporting God's ministries.

Dear Grace and Emmanuel, et al.,

It seems I am writing this newsletter to a lot of congregations right now, and I would like to invite the Grace/Emmanuel parish to hold St. Johns, Hebron, and St. Paul's in your prayers and they discern the next steps of their interim transition. The three of them are the et al. in the salutation. May they be guided by the Holy Spirit in accordance with God's word.

Let me tell all of you that Lent is unquestionably my favorite season of the Church year. I mean that in all sincerity. Lent is the one season outside of "ordinary time" that Madison Avenue hasn't figured out how to co-opt, and I don't think they will. The central practices of the season are prayer, fasting, and giving of alms. None of these are easily marketable. The world often looks at them as trials to be endured. The 40 days of the liturgical season itself are modeled on the temptation of Jesus in the wilderness.

I thought of putting that passage at the top of this page and pointing out that Jesus was filled with the Holy Spirit during that time, but being "filled with the Spirit" is an abstract phrase for many of us in mainline Christianity. Instead, I chose to include a passage describing a community that dedicated themselves to these practices. That passage doesn't sound like much of a trial, does it? It actually sounds rather wonderful, and yet they were devoted to prayer, alms and fasting.

They were devoted to daily prayer. They gave alms to the point that they held no possessions, and they fasted from all the worlds greed, subsisting only on what they held in common. They did all of this that seems so austere and arrived at glad and generous hearts. They even maintained the goodwill of all the people, not just the other disciples. That's the way I like to view Lent.

These forty days are an opportunity to rededicate ourselves to the practices and spiritual experiences that drew many of us to the Church in the first place. It's a time to reconnect with the Holy Spirit. It is also a great time to find the Holy Spirit in the first place. Dedicated to communal prayer, alms, and fasting we can find ourselves filled with glad and generous hearts. I can't promise that the Lord will add to the numbers of those with membership in our institution, but day by day the Lord will add to the number of those being saved.

I invite the et al. contingent to look through your newsletters and see the opportunities your community is offering you to experience the practices of Lent. At Grace/Emmanuel we will be having a Wednesday Lent Luncheon with prayer service focused around the five senses. The doors of the Church hosting that Wednesday's will be opened from Tuesday through Friday at 9:00 AM as I will lead the daily Matins (morning prayer). Our loose offerings continue to put your Alms into the community, and your presence is a blessing to all. Let us make our way towards Holy Week breaking bread together with glad and generous hearts.

FEBRUARY COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

Committee Reports:

Property: Clarence will report under old business.

<u>Worship</u>: Approval was given to update our hymn license to include streaming of our services on Facebook and Zoom. Our current license does not include streaming permission.

<u>Christian Ed</u>: We are swapping VBS material with Pastor Damon's church. This will cut costs for both churches. We also will need to check all helper's clearances so they are up to date.

<u>Joint Council</u>: They met January 24,2023 at 6:00 P.M. All previously planned services/events are still on at this time. Hebron is looking into getting their own Zoom account. We are planning to meet with our fellow Lutheran churches on July 16, 2023 at 10:00 A.M. for a joint outdoor summer worship service at Crooked Creek State Park. Their next meeting is April 25, 2023 at 6:00 P.M.

Unfinished Business:

1. Covid worship protocol will remain the same with masks optional.

2. Home visitation schedule is being set up. A sign up sheet is in the narthex for anyone who would like to be part of that visitation.

3. Crash door update was given by Clarence. He and Leland met with the locksmith concerning making our front entrance a crash door in case of an emergency.

It would be very costly to change the existing door to a crash door. We could install a magnetic lock that would open with a key from outside but would be able to exit from inside without a key. The cost to do that is \$2700.00 plus \$200.00 for the outside key. Another suggestion was to put a turn lock on the interior side of the door that could be locked during service but unlocked from inside without a key. That would cost \$125.00.

We are tabling this for now.

New Business:

1. Spring clean-up day will be March 25, 9-noon. We will be cleaning the inside of the church and the fellowship hall.

2. Vandergrift Pride Day will be held June 24, 2023 from noon to 8:00 P.M. Pam and Gregg attended a planning meeting on February 12, 2023. This will be held at Kennedy Park in Vandergrift. We will look to possibly have a booth at this event. Pam and Gregg will go to the next meeting on March 12, 2023.

4. Organ repair is needed. It was found that the relay switch is short circuiting. This is a fire hazard. It needs to be repaired now. An estimate will be submitted soon.

In order to cover the cost of replacement, Gregg suggested that SPH Thrivent members could apply for an Action Team which is \$250.00 for each policy they have with them. If enough members were willing to do that, the price of the repair would be less for the church to cover. We will ask the congregation to let us know if they are members of Thrivent and if they are willing to help.

5. Update SPH Constitution. This has not been done in years and is something that needs to be done. We will look to table this discussion until next month's meeting.
